...And to prove my tatting vanity...I just couldn't stand the thought of hiding half of my tatted lace behind an elastic ribbon. Tat the top row, ending at the base of the first heart. Then tat a single utility lock chain long enough to reach the second joining row. The number of stitches for the lock chain will depend upon how tightly you tat. Begin the second row of tatting around in the opposite direction from the first to easily achieve front side appearance. The stitch count for this garter is a "no brainer". This design is easy to get the hang of and shouldn't require carrying a pattern with you.

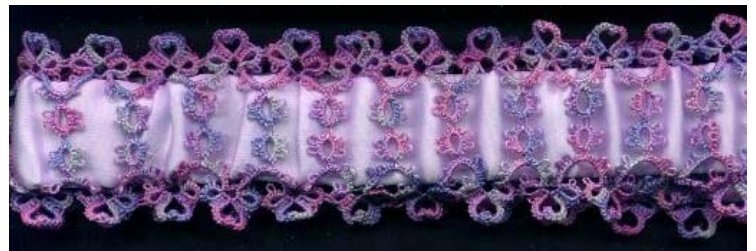
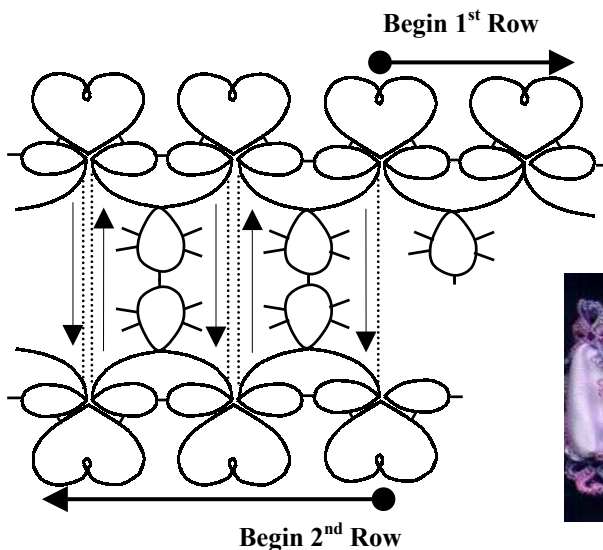
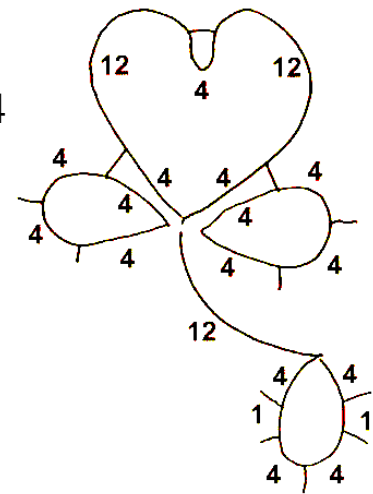
R 4 - 4 - 4 - 4
